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Domestic Homicide in New York State 2013

This report, compiled by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS), presents a statistical account of domestic homicide reported by state and local police in New York State during 2013.

Definitions: Domestic homicide involves a murder or non-negligent manslaughter in which the victim was known to have a domestic relationship with the offender, including an intimate partner or another family member.¹ An “intimate partner” relationship includes spouse, ex-spouse, heterosexual or same-sex partner as well as an ex-partner, whether or not the victim and offender resided together at the time of the incident or previously.² “Other family member” includes child,³ parent, sibling or other family relationship.

Data: The data analyzed for this report are taken from the Supplementary Homicide Report (SHR) submitted by law enforcement agencies to DCJS. Part of New York State’s Uniform Crime Reporting program (UCR), the SHR collects case-level information on all criminal homicides reported by police, including: victim-offender relationship, demographic characteristics of victim

and offender (gender, race/ethnicity and age), as well as the circumstances of the homicide and the type of weapon used.⁴

Overview: Domestic homicides are compared in this report with all other homicides statewide and by region. Regional homicide data are presented for the five counties of New York City and the Rest of the State, composed of the 57 counties Upstate and Long Island. Statistics are presented on the demographic characteristics of homicide victims, the circumstances surrounding the homicide and the types of weapons used.

Special attention is given to intimate partner homicide, which is the most frequent type of domestic homicide. In addition, relevant findings from the analysis of homicides involving minor child victims and other family member victims also are presented.

Domestic homicide trends across the five-year period from 2009 to 2013 are detailed in an additional section of this report. Finally, appendices detail domestic homicide by county and region.

Major Findings

- The victims in 22.4 percent of all homicides reported in 2013 had a domestic relationship with their offenders (p. 2).
- Domestic homicides increased 5 percent from 2012 to 2013 (p. 10).
- Statewide, intimate partner homicides increased 16 percent from 75 in 2012 to 87 in 2013 (p. 10).
- In the Rest of the State, 49 intimate partner homicides were reported. This is the highest number reported in five years (p. 11).
- Statewide, 51.5 percent (67 of 130) of all female homicide victims age 16 and older were killed by intimate partners. This compares to 4 percent (19 of 469) of male homicide victims age 16 and older (p. 3).
- 46 of 62 counties reported at least one homicide in 2013. In 16 of these counties (35%), all reported homicides were domestic (p. 14).

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¹ Homicide is defined as “the willful killing of one human being by another.” *Uniform Crime Reporting Handbook*. Murder and non-negligent manslaughter refer to crimes in New York State Penal Laws Section 125.15 through Section 125.27 and include: murder in the first and second degree, aggravated murder, aggravated manslaughter in the first and second degree, and manslaughter in the first and second degree.

² New York Criminal Procedure Law section 530.11(1)(a-e).

³ “Child” is defined as under 18 years old and includes a biological or adopted child, as well as a child who is killed by the intimate partner of his or her parent.

⁴ New York City homicide data are extracted from the New York City Police Department Shootings and Homicides database, which differs from the SHR but not in ways that substantially affect this analysis.

State and Regional Overview of Domestic Homicides

Table 1 presents a statewide breakdown of domestic homicides compared to all other homicides.⁵

- In 2013, police in New York State reported a total of 643 homicide victims in 605 incidents. Victims in 144 homicides (22.4%) had a domestic relationship with their offenders.
- In 87 homicides, the victim and offender were intimate partners. Intimate partner homicides represented 60.4 percent of domestic homicides and 13.5 percent of all homicides.
- 57 homicide victims were killed by other family members. These victims most commonly were the child, parent, grandparent or sibling of the offender.

Eleven domestic homicide incidents reported in 2013 involved multiple victims. These incidents involved a total of 26 victims, including seven children. Additional details:

Three were murder-suicides, in which offenders killed their intimate partners, themselves and others; the offender in each of these incidents is not counted as a victim:

- In one incident, a male offender killed his wife and their two young sons ages 9 and 13.
- In one incident, a female offender killed her intimate male partner and their 1-year old son.
- In one incident, a female offender killed her husband and her boyfriend.

Five involved male offenders killing their intimate partner and others:

- In four incidents, the offender killed his ex-intimate female partner and a second victim. Two of the second victims were identified as the victim's mother, one was a male friend, and one was the victim's boyfriend.
- In one incident, the offender killed his wife and his girlfriend.

Three involved family members killing other family members:

- In one incident, the offender killed his cousin's wife and four children (two sons ages 1 and 5 and two daughters ages 7 and 9).

⁵ The "all other" type of homicide relationship includes categories in which the victim's relationship to the offender was known (e.g., friend, acquaintance, stranger, or otherwise known) or where the victim-offender relationship was unknown.

⁶ As reported to DCJS through June 4, 2014.

⁷ It is unlikely that a substantial number of homicides where victim-offender relationships were unknown were, in fact, domestic in nature. A further analysis of the 308 homicides with unknown victim-offender relationships revealed that only 24 involved females – the most common gender of domestic homicide victims. Not one of these involved an argument, a circumstance frequently associated with domestic homicide.

Table 2 compares domestic and other homicides in New York City and the Rest of the State. Of the 643 homicides reported statewide in 2013, 335 (52%) occurred in New York City and 308 (48%) occurred in the Rest of the State. See Appendix A for county and regional statistics.

- New York City reported 61 domestic homicides, accounting for 18.2 percent of all homicides in the five boroughs. In the Rest of the State, 26.9 percent (83) of all reported homicides were domestic.
- More than half of all domestic homicides in New York City and the Rest of the State were committed by intimate partners.

Table 3 compares the gender of homicide victims 16 and older, both statewide and by region. In 2013, 599 (93.1%) of the 643 homicide victims were 16 or older.

- Female homicide victims were most likely to be killed by their intimate partners. Statewide, among 130 female homicide victims age 16 or older in 2013, 67 (51.5%) were killed by their intimate partners.

⁸For this report, intimate partners include spouse, ex-spouse, heterosexual partner or ex-partner, and same-sex partner or ex-partner, whether or not the victim and offender were living together at the time of the homicide or had previously lived together. NYPD homicide statistics include victims of domestic homicide incidents who are not intimate partners or members of the same family. These victims are excluded in this report.

⁹ NOTE: This table does not include a 15-year old female victim killed by her 20-year old male intimate partner in NYC.

Demographics of Domestic Homicide Victims

Table 4 presents the gender and race/ethnicity of domestic and other homicide victims in 2013, statewide and by region.

Gender

- Females were victims in 78.2 percent (68 of 87) of intimate partner homicides statewide in 2013, but only 11.4 percent (57 of 499) of victims of all other homicides.
- Of the 57 other family members who were domestic homicide victims statewide, 20 were female and 37 were male.

Race and Ethnicity

- Statewide, 41.7 percent (60) of domestic homicide victims were white, 33.3 percent (48) were black, and 14.6 percent (21) were Hispanic.
- New York City reported more black (29) and Hispanic victims (16) of domestic homicide than white victims (9).
- In the Rest of the State, 51 whites, 19 blacks and five Hispanics were the victims of domestic homicide.
- Among the 87 intimate partner homicide victims statewide in 2013, 39.1 percent (34) were white, with seven in New York City (18.4%) and 27 (55.1%) in the Rest of the State.
- Blacks were victims in 31 intimate partner homicides statewide (35.6%), with 17 reported in New York City (44.7%) and 14 (28.6%) in the Rest of the State.
- Hispanics were victims in 17 intimate partner homicides statewide (19.5%), with 13 in New York City (34.2%) and four (8.2%) in the Rest of the State.

Table 5 presents domestic homicide victims according to the type of relationship and age group for the entire state and by region.

- Statewide, 62.1 percent (54) of the 87 intimate partner homicide victims were between the ages of 30 and 49.
- Among the 21 elderly (60 years and older) victims of domestic homicide, nine were intimate partners of the offenders. Eight of the nine elder intimate partner homicides occurred in Rest of the State.
- Almost half (47.3%) of other family victims were children 15 or younger, including 33.3 percent (19) who were 4 or younger. Table 6 provides additional details on minor child victims of domestic homicide.

Minor Child Victims

Table 6 presents demographic information on minor child domestic homicide victims. A minor child is a person under 18 years old who was killed either by a parent, a parent's intimate partner or another family member.

- Statewide, there were 27 minor child victims of domestic homicide in 2013. Among minor child victims, 11 were reported in New York City and 16 in the Rest of the State.
- Sixteen minor child victims were killed by a parent and five by their parent's intimate partner. Five minor victims were killed by another family member and one by a sibling. (Data not presented).
- Statewide, 19 minor child victims were younger than 5 (70.3%); nine of those victims were infants who were less than 1.

Circumstances of Domestic Homicide

Table 7 presents the circumstances surrounding domestic homicides in 2013 as reported by police. Circumstances include argument, murder-suicide, other felony involved¹⁰, physical abuse/neglect, other and unknown.

- An argument was reported as the leading circumstance in 60.4 percent (87 of 144) of domestic homicides and 66.7 percent (58 of 87) of intimate partner homicides. In 6.3 percent (nine) of domestic homicides, the circumstance surrounding the death was unknown.
- In 17 (11.8%) of the domestic homicides, the offender also committed suicide. Thirteen of those murder-suicides involved intimate partners while four involved other family members.
- Of the 13 murder-suicides involving intimate partners, 12 occurred in the Rest of the State, and one in New York City.
- Women were the victims and men the offenders in 10 of the 13 intimate partner murder-suicides. (Data not presented).

¹⁰ Other Felony Involved refers to a homicide that occurred as a result of the commission of another felonious crime, such as arson, robbery or burglary.

Weapons Used in Domestic Homicide

Table 8 provides statewide and regional breakdowns on the type of weapon used in domestic homicides by the relationship of the victim to the offender. Weapon types include firearms (handguns, rifles, shotguns and other firearms); knives, cutting instruments, or blunt objects; personal weapons (hands, feet and teeth); and miscellaneous weapons (motor vehicle, fire and poison).

- Knives, cutting instruments or blunt objects were the most common weapon used in domestic homicides statewide (65 of 144). Firearms were used in 26.4 percent (38).
- Among intimate partner homicides, a knife, cutting instrument or blunt object was the primary weapon used against 50.6 percent (44) of victims while a firearm was used against 32.2 percent (28) of victims.
- In the Rest of the State, 42.9 percent (21) of intimate partner homicides involved a firearm, while in New York City, firearms were used in 18.4 percent (seven) of intimate partner homicides.
- Among the 57 other family domestic homicides, 21 (36.8%) involved knives, cutting instruments or blunt objects and 17 (29.8%) involved personal weapons (hands, feet, teeth).
- Statewide, the type of weapon used was unknown or not reported in three domestic homicides.

Trends in Domestic Homicide 2009 - 2013

This report is part of a series of annual reports on domestic homicide in New York State. This section compares domestic homicides over the five-year period from 2009 through 2013. Figure 1. Total Domestic Homicides: Statewide, 2009-2013





Figure 2. Intimate Partner Homicides: Statewide, 2009-2013



- Domestic homicides increased by 5.1 percent from 2012 to 2013. During the five-year period, the highest number was reported in 2011.
- Intimate partner homicides have ranged from a low of 74 to a high of 90 over the past five years.

Figure 3. Minor Child Homicides: Statewide, 2009-2013





Figure 4. Other Family Homicides: Statewide, 2009-2013




- The number of minor child domestic homicide victims has decreased each year since 2010.
- The number of other family victims fluctuated over the past five years from a low of 24 to a high of 46.

Regional Trends in Domestic Homicide 2009 - 2013

Figures 5-8 show domestic homicides reported from 2009 through 2013 in New York City and the Rest of the State by type of relationship.

NYC vs. Rest of the State**




**Figure 6. Intimate Partner Homicides:
NYC vs. Rest of the State**




- In New York City, domestic homicide reached its highest point in 2011 with 94 reported that year. In Rest of the State, domestic homicide reached its highest point in 2013 with 83 reported.

- Intimate partner homicides in New York City reached a five-year high of 49 in 2011. In the Rest of the State, there were 49 intimate partner homicides, which was the highest in five years.

- The number of minor child victims of domestic homicide have ranged from seven to 25 in New York City over the past five years. In the Rest of the State, the number of minor child victims has ranged from 11 to 21 annually.

- With the exception of the 30 reported in New York City in 2011, the numbers of other family homicide victims reported have remained fairly stable over the past five years.

Comparison of Gender of Intimate Partner Homicide Victims

Table 9 shows gender trends in intimate partner (IP) homicide victims and all homicide victims who were 16 or older during the five-year period from 2009 through 2013.

- In 2013, 51.5 percent of all female homicide victims who were 16 or older were killed by their intimate partners.
- Four percent of male homicide victims were killed by their intimate partners in 2013.
- From 2012 to 2013 in New York City, the number of female IP victims decreased from 33 to 27 while the number of male intimate partner victims increased from seven to 10.
- In 2013, the number of female IP victims in the Rest of the State reached a five-year high of 40. The number of male intimate partner victims increased by two, from seven in 2012 to nine in 2013.
